of children of incarcerated mothers lived with a grandparent or other relative. Although research has indicated that parents and children should visit one another, less than 50% of prisoners receive visits from their children. Oklahoma's incarceration rate of 622 offenders per 100,000 population is the third highest in the nation. Among females, the incarceration rate of 122 per 100,000 leads the nations.

Research indicates prisoners who try to maintain their family ties do much better when they're released. Because children are vulnerable to the negative consequences of the incarceration of a parent, reentry and after care programs that include the children can foster strengthening and maintaining family ties.
